

## Paul Bourget

Paul Bourget is an avid American Civil War enthusiast. As a member of the federal Generals Corps, based in Pennsylvania, Bourget has ben an active living historian, portraying Bvt. Major General George Sears Greene for the past thirteen years at many major reenactments.

While portraying General Greene, Bourget has given presentations on various aspects of the

Civil War at various schools, colleges, museums, and historical societies.

On April 25, 2023, General Greene will discuss the impact that the battle of Chancellorsville (April 30-May 6, 1863) had on union and confederate commanders, officers, and men who fought at the Battle of Gettysburg two months later.

After an incredible start to the Chancellorsville Campaign, where Fighting Joe Hooker got behind Gen'l Robert E, Lee's forces at Fredericksburg, VA, Hooker's plan fell apart. Outnumbered over two to one, Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, overwhelmed Union forces at Chancellorsville, giving Lee his best victory of the war.



The Union Army of the Potomac was ready to avenge the defeat and were eager for a fight....even at great cost. General Greene and the XLL Corps were looking for payback.

#### .... More about General George Sears Greene

While we all aware of his heroic effort on July 2, 1863, defending Little Round Top, let's review "Pap" Greene's beginnings as a civil engineer.

George Sears Green (May 6, 1801-Jan28,1899) was a part of the Greene family of Rhode island, which had a record of distinguished military service to the United States.

He first served in the Army from 1823 to 1836 after graduating second from his class at West Point. As a civilian, we was one of the founders of the American Society of Civil Engineers and Architects and was responsible for numerous railroads and aqueduct construction projects in the northeastern United States.

During his tenure as an assistant professor of mathematics at West Point, one of the students he taught during this period was Cadet Robert E. Lee.



As a civil engineer he built the municipal sewage and water systems for New York City and Detroit. In New York City he designed the Croton Aqueduct reservoir in Central Park and enlarged the High Bridge over the Harlem River.

Despite being out of the Army for 25 years, and over the age of 60, the crisis of the Union compelled Greene to rejoin the Army. He was appointed the Colonel of the 60th New York Volunteer Infantry on January 18, 1862. Greene was later elevated to Division and Brigade command and distinguished himself a dozen or more battles, before his famous stand at Little Round Top.

While he does not get the credit bestowed on Col. Chamberlain, 20th Maine, General Greene deserves an equal amount of credit for securing the other end of the Union line on July 2.

#### More about our speaker, Paul Bourget

Paul Bourget, CPA, is the owner and President of Bourget & Associates, with more than forty-five years of public accounting and consulting experience. He was the editor, researcher, and co-writer of the **Towers of Faith and Family,** a history of Woonsocket's St. Ann's parish, and he was the founding President of St. Ann's Arts and Cultural Center. He currently serves as the Past President of the Museum of Work & Culture's Preservation Foundation, Trustee of the RIC Foundation, Past Grand Knight of the Woonsocket Council 113 of the Knights of Columbus, and Chairman of the Woonsocket School Committee. Paul and his wife Denise live in Woonsocket, RI.





#### ....APRIL 1865 THE FINAL MONTH OF THE WAR—CRITICAL EVENTS DAY BY DAY

Appomattox Campaign begins

...April 1 Battle of Five Forks. "Hold Five Forks At All Hazards" Gen. Lee told George E. Pickett. If the Confederate line at Petersburg falls, the retreat route of the Army of Northern Virginia would be threatened.


Five Forks collapses. Leading Confederate generals, including Pickett were attending a shad bake, unaware of the disaster..

...April 4 The Confederate government evacuates Richmond. President Lincoln arrives in Petersburg to witness fighting.

...April 4 President Lincoln travels on the River Queen and via a gig with 12 rowers to Richmond, landing near Libby prison.

... April 6 Lee meets Grant's Army at Sayler's Creek. Lee's Army is gets strung out and separated.





...April 7 Grant opens correspondence with Lee. Lee asks Grant to outline his terms. They are near Farmville, Virginia. Lincoln awaits at City Point, - "Let The Thing Be Pressed"

... April 8 Lee responds to Grant that things have not yet progressed to the point of a surrender.

... April 9 Surrender of the

Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox Court House. Lincoln returns to Washington D.C. Fighting continues at Mobile, Alabama.

...April 13 Sherman enters Raleigh, NC. Ceremony at Appomattox Court House, Virginia





...April 14 Good Friday. U.S. Flag raised over
Fort Sumter. John Wilkes Booth assassinates President Abraham Lincoln at
Ford's Theatre during performance of <u>Our American Cousin.</u>

...April 15 Abraham Lincoln is dead. " Now He Belongs To The Ages" . Andrew Johnson takes oath.

...April 17 Genls. William T. Sherman and Joseph E. Johnston meet at Bennet House near Durham N.C. Booth and Davy Herold hiding in woods in Maryland. President Davis and his party are near Salisbury, N.C. enroute to Charlotte.

... April 19 Funeral services for Abraham Lincoln

...April 26 Surrender of Joseph E. Johnston. John Wilkes Booth captured and killed.
