Judge Robert J. Kane

Topic: Lincoln and the War Powers

Judge Kane graduated from Fairfield University and has his law degree from Boston College Law School.

He has served in the Bristol County District Attorney's office, and as a defense attorney with the Massachusetts Defenders Committee, a District Court Judge, and as executive director of the Governor's Committee on Criminal Justice under Governor Michael Dukakis



He was appointed to the Massachusetts Superior Court as an associate justice, by former Governor Paul Cellucci. Judge Kane retired in 2017.

On May 28th, our speaker will be Chuck Veit, Naval Historian and author. Chuck has been with us several times and never fails to impress. His naval history knowledge is formidable. We look forward to his return.




More news from the Round Table...





BOOK RELEASES THAT MAY INTEREST YOU

Lincoln's Autocrat: The Life of Edwin Stanton, by William Marvel

Edwin M. Stanton (1814-1869), one of the nineteenth century's most impressive legal and political minds, wielded enormous influence and power as Lincoln's Secretary of War during most of the Civil War and under Johnson during the early years of Reconstruction. Marvel argues that while Stanton was a formidable advocate and politician, his character was hardly benign. Climbing from a difficult youth to the pinnacle of power, Stanton used his authority, and the public coffers, to pursue political vendettas, and he exercised sweeping wartime powers with a cavalier disregard for civil liberties.





<u>Brought Forth On This Continent: Abraham Lincoln and American Immigration</u>, by Harold Holzer


From the acclaimed Abraham Lincoln historian Harold Holzer, a ground-breaking account of Lincoln's grappling with the politics of immigration against the backdrop of war.

In the three decades before the Civil War, some 10 million foreign-born people settled in the United States, forever altering the nation's demographics, culture, and, perhaps most significantly, voting patterns. America's newest residents fueled the national economy, but they wrought enormous changes in the political landscape and exposed an ugly, at times, violent, vein of nativist bigotry. Tensions over immigration would split and ultimately destroy Lincoln's Whig Party years before the Civil War.

<u>Abraham Lincoln: A Life, by Michael Burlingame, Author</u>

Hailed as the definitive portrait of the sixteenth president, Lincoln scholar Michael Burlingame's impressive two volume biography has been masterfully abridged and revised.

Sixteenth president of the United States, the Great Emancipator, and a surprisingly eloquent champion of national unity, freedom, and democracy, Abraham Lincoln is arguably the most studied and admired of all American. Based on deep research in unpublished sources, this work reveals how Lincoln's character and personality were the North's secret weapon in the Civil War, the key variables that spelled the difference between victory and defeat.

...April 13, 1861 Fort Sumter surrenders. Washington D.C. isolated.

...April 3, 1862 Both armies begin movements toward Shiloh Church, Tenn






...April 5, 1862 General McClellan is in front of Yorktown, Va, on the Peninsula. Siege begins.

...April 9, 1862 Lincoln urging McClellan, "You Must Act"

... April 12, 1862 The Great Locomotive Chase Big Shanty Georgia

... April 2, 1863 Richmond bread riots

...April 9, 1864 Grant issues his orders for all the armies in the field. Meade to make Lee his objective. Banks to move on Mobile, Ala, Sherman to go toward Georgia against Johnston, Sigel into the Shenandoah, Butler toward Richmond.



...April 1, 1865 Battle of Five Forks, VA (The Shad Bake)

...April 2, 1865 Confederates evacuate Richmond. Petersburg is captured.



...April 4, 1865 Lincoln visits Richmond. Lee moving west hoping to be supplied

...April 6, 1865 Battle of Sayler's Creek. Last major engagement.

...April 9, 1865 Surrender at Appomattox Court House

... April 14, 1865 Good Friday, Lincoln assassinated



...April 24 John Wilkes Booth captured and killed
